We need to stop people outside the sport talking about basketball "being quite small in England", or "being a young sport", or "being a sleeping giant".

Basketball is one of only a few sports that is currently growing and I am determined to push England Basketball to taking the lead in bringing all stakeholders in our sport Of course there are areas where we can and will improve, but now I have a far better understanding of all the fantastic work that is being done by people throughout the game, including club volunteers, coaches, players, sponsors and the people within England Basketball.

Throughout this report you will find a lot more detail about what England Basketball has been involved in and what has been achieved. I will only pick up on one point and that is to say a massive thank you to Keith Mair who joined the organisation over a decade ago when England Basketball was in a very dark place. Keith has done a fantastic job turning England Basketball into a financially stable organisation, giving us a robust platform to launch the next phase in our strategy and putting basketball firmly among the big sports in England.

I look forward to meeting many more of you over the coming year.

YEAR ENDING 31 MAY 2013

The past year represents the fourth and final year of our four year (2009-13) plan and my tenth and final full year as your Chief Executive. Consequently it gives me considerable pleasure to report on a year in which we have continued to achieve success and/or growth, particularly in the following areas:

- Developing 3-on-3 basketball
- Participation affiliated / informal
- International performance and talent pathways
- Governance restructuring the Board
- Club development
- School / college basketball
- · Financial stability return on investment

3-on-3 Basketball

Half-court basketball has long been popular as a less formal indoor/outdoor format of the game suitable for people of all ages and abilities. It provides a basis for our highly successful *IM Basketball* and *Ball Again* participation programmes, while in recent years FIBA Europe and FIBA have promoted and invested heavily in the 3-on-3 version of the game.

Unquestionably a highlight of the year was our ability to make full use of the generosity and support of FIBA Europe in order to stage a wonderful two-day 3-on-3 event at Sheffield's Meadowhall Shopping Centre. The photos and notes in this report elaborate on the story and we sincerely thank FIBA Europe and their 3-on-3 Manager Robert Rieblinger for bringing their equipment all the way to Sheffield. The FIBA 3x3 World Championships followed, each featuring 24 countries, with the England senior men's and women's teams finishing 11th and 14th and the U18 women's team making the quarter-finals before ending a highly creditable 7th place. FIBA will stage a 3x3 World Championship for U18 teams this year, for which the England U18 women's team has again qualified.

3-on-3 momentum has continued into the current year with four England Basketball FIBA 3x3 tournaments, three at universities in Worcester, Leeds and East London and one at the newly refurbished Ravenscourt Park courts in London. We sincerely thank the Outdoor Basketball Initiative for sponsoring the refurbishment as well as the tournament itself.

Unquestionably a highlight of the year was our ability to make full use of the generosity and support of FIBA Europe in order to stage a wonderful two-day 3-on-3 event at Sheffield's Meadowhall Shopping Centre.





Participation:

Our 2012 Annual Report described the challenges faced by national sports organisations in the quest to increase participation and outlined our ongoing efforts to deal with these. It is therefore extremely satisfying to report that, unlike many other sports, our numbers stabilised, recovered and grew as a result of our initiatives and as the economy moves out of recession. Sam Spare and his team, especially Todd Cauthorn, has proved to be highly effective and the implementation of the *IM Basketball* and *Ball Again* programmes has been a resounding success. We are well positioned to capitalise on Sport England's revised focus from 16+ to 14+ participation over the next four years and will enable England Basketball to continue to increase participation. The numbers speak for themselves:

The work and research carried out by

- a) Affiliated Participation has increased by 13.6% (from 43,653 to 49,588) over the past year, growth over the four year term amounts to 46.5% (from 33,856), and over the past decade the increase is close to 250%! An examination of the figures illustrates the positive effect of the new programmes; however in some parts of the country the loss of a County Basketball Development Officer saw a decline in affiliations. The introduction of Basketball Participation Coordinators, focussed on *IM Basketball* and *Ball Again* and working with an expanded range of providers, will address the situation.
- b) Affiliated Coaches and Officials have increased modestly in recent years while overall growth for the decade, combining accredited and affiliated coaches, referees and table officials, is well in excess of 600%. It is to the credit of development staff members Brian Aldred and Simon Unsworth that these numbers have continually grown.
- c) Active People Survey: The national sport participation surveys, commissioned by Sport England for people aged 16 and older, clearly illustrates that we have been effective in stabilising and growing participation over the past six and a half years.

The initial and largest Active People Survey was for the year to 31 October 2006 and came before the disposable incomes of many families were detrimentally affected by the recessionary period from 2009 to 2012. Our own data demonstrated that this was a difficult time for many clubs and people from disadvantaged communities to maintain their participation in sport. The demand-supply equation for an indoor team sport suffers when costs and/or competitive demand increases. Both these factors have been in evidence in recent years and when combined with a period of pressure on personal and family incomes present a serious challenge to increasing participation in sport.

Basketball, netball and volleyball are the only team sports to have increased participation between October 2006 and April 2013. Other sports to show significant declines in participation in that period are gymnastics (-16.6%), squash (-14%), golf (-13.1%), swimming (-11.7%), rowing (-8.9%), tennis (-7.2%) and badminton (-3.4%).



The national sport participation surveys, commissioned by Sport England for people aged 16 and older, clearly illustrates that we have been effective in stabilising and growing participation over the past six and a half years.

The performance / talent pathway now in place is a world class structure to be proud of that will assuredly produce continuing success and constantly improved international results.

The independent directors bring with them objectivity and an overall vision of basketball in England that people with a vested or conflict of interest are often unable to do.

International Performance and Pathways:



London's Olympics were an undoubted highlight for basketball in England, with the on-court performances of the British teams a credit to those responsible since the formation of the British Basketball Federation in November 2005. The performance / talent pathway now in place is a world class structure to be proud of that will assuredly produce continuing success and everimproving international results.

The steady improvement in the results of England's age-group teams in European competition continued in 2012 with the U18 men's and women's teams emulating the history making double success of the U16 girls' and boys' teams in 2011 by winning promotion, for the first time ever, to the A Division. My sincere congratulations go to Head Coaches Steve Bucknall (U18 men) and Len Busch (U18 women), along with their players and staff members.

The achievement of these four teams, along with the British U20 teams (women in 2010 and recently, in July, the men) in reaching European A Division status is exceptional when reviewed in the context of past performances. As we went to print with this report, in late July, the U18 men's team had just created their own piece of history by becoming the first England team to retain A Division status, with wins over Spain, Italy, Ukraine and the Czech Republic, to finish in 9th place. The wins and the placing represent further progress,

Governance – Restructuring the Board:

Responding to the recommendations of a Board commissioned independent review, and the requirements of Sport England, the 2012 Annual General Meeting approved changes to the Memorandum and Articles of Association that brought England Basketball in line with modern principles for good governance.

Following the AGM an open recruitment process was followed to enable the appointment of an independent Chair and three other independent directors. As a result we acquired six new board members, two outstanding performances and an incredible result, again from Steve Bucknall and his team. The next big challenge for England U16 and U18 teams is to achieve a top five place in Europe and qualification for a World Championship at U17 or U19 level.

The England Basketball performance pathway currently starts at Regional (formerly Area) Performance Centres (20) for boys and girls, progresses through Regional Development Tournaments for U13, U15 and U17 girls' and boys', national club, school and college competitions, the Advanced Apprenticeship in Sporting Excellence (AASE) and national teams / squads for each year from U15 to U18, and culminates with British U20 and senior teams.

Success hasn't come quickly or easily. Much of the current structure was initiated when Radmila Turner began with us as our first Performance Manager in 2004. Since then Radmila's initiatives have been steadily developed, in recent years by current Performance Manager Martin Bland, British Performance Basketball staff members and directors, and, most important of all, the large number of volunteer coaches and managers. The AASE programme, introduced in 2009 and under Charlie Ford's watchful guidance, has also played its part; the current England U18 teams contain 17 AASE students while the British U20 teams contained 10 AASE graduates / students.

newly elected and four independent and appointed, with a "range and balance of skills, knowledge, equality and diversity to fulfil and discharge their responsibilities".

The changes to the composition of the Board have been refreshing in that the independent directors bring with them objectivity and an overall vision of basketball in England that people with a vested or conflict of interest are often unable to do. Details of the Board changes may be found on page 30 of this report.

Our Vision And Priorities

ENGLAND BASKETBALL'S VISION IS TO PROVIDE BASKETBALL FOR ALL

Our vision touches on each of our core activities as a governing body, which are summarised in the organisation's **mission** to:

- Encourage and enable people to participate in basketball regardless of their ability, age, gender, status, disability or ethnic background.
- Enhance the performance and quality of basketball throughout England.

ENGLAND BASKETBALL'S PRIORITIES ARE DIRECTLY RELATED TO THIS VISION:

1) TO CREATE AND MAINTAIN A CULTURE OF FREQUENT, CONSISTENT AND CONTINUED PARTICIPATION.

2) TO PROVIDE A CLEARLY DEFINED TALENT DEVELOPMENT PATHWAY FROM THE GRASSROOTS THROUGH TO WORLD-CLASS PERFORMANCE.

These priorities are to be accomplished by achieving the following measures of success:

- Increasing participation as measured by Sport England's Active People Survey.
- Increasing our activity in the education sector (secondary and tertiary) through IM Basketball.
- Improving transition from school to club through the creation of basketball satellite clubs in secondary schools together with an increase in the number, size and quality of Sport England – England Basketball Clubmark accredited clubs.
- Increasing the number of adults playing basketball consistently on an informal and formal basis through Ball Again.
- Increasing the number of specialist basketball facilities and continuing to work towards clubs and players obtaining affordable or free access to basketball facilities.
- Developing appropriate local delivery chains by commissioning relevant partners to deliver participation programmes.
- Offering an excellent customer experience through a workforce, both professional and voluntary, appropriate in number, location and quality.
- Developing and enhancing an environment that recognises, retains and rewards volunteers aligned to affiliated organisations.
- · Maintaining and improving the national competition structures for clubs and schools.

Club Development:

The last four years have seen continued growth in participation within affiliated clubs and we have exceeded the targets for the number of *Clubmark* accredited clubs (133) and the number of young people within these clubs (over 16,000). Under the leadership of Matt Baird the *Premier League 4 Sport* programme has engaged over 1,600 young people in new satellite clubs over the past eighteen months, a figure which almost doubles the target of 900.

Healthy clubs combined with good schoolclub links are vital for further growth and development. The implementation of the Satellite Club programme, driven by the positive experience obtained from the *Premier League 4 Sport* programme, puts England Basketball in a strong position for the four years from 2013 to 2017.

England Basketball Reserves Policy:

To achieve and maintain a level of reserves equivalent to one year's operating costs in order to be able to withstand any significant reduction in income

England Basketball

Investments Policy: All surplus cash to be invested in bank deposits throughout the year. This is a minimal risk investment and is not linked to stocks and shares.

School / College Basketball:

In 2009 we took over the management of the National Schools Competitions and year on year have added to the age-groups on offer. The competitions have grown dramatically to meet the high levels of demand for school basketball and now cover every age group from U13 through to U19 with a number of age groups offering two levels of competition (Premier or Conference). The number of schools participating continues to increase and at present we are ahead of last year's entries for the upcoming season.

Financial Stability – Return on Investment:

The accounts for the year to 31 May 2013 reflect an organisation in a strong and stable financial position. In addition the employment of effective cost controls and financial policies and procedures ensures that we effectively utilise our income. This effective use of public funding shows England Basketball to provide a return on investment that few, if any, sports can match. Return on investment comparisons can be made based on Active People Survey participation numbers and/or funding for facilities.

Our 2009-13 capital funding for facilities saw £1.6m invested in four projects, East London, Leeds, Worcester and Manchester. Thirteen basketball courts were built as a result, providing excellent value for the money,

especially as the investment attracted £38m in partnership funding and delivered more than 130,000 dedicated court hours for our club, participation and performance programmes.

Conclusion:

The contents of this Annual Report reflect a lengthy period of stability, growth and achievement for England Basketball. The credit for this can largely be attributed to an able, innovative and industrious staff team who have proved to be loyal and dedicated to the organisation and the Board. Working with the expanded Board, containing several new members possessing a wide array of skills and expertise, will ensure a positive long term future for basketball in England. A further plus for the organisation has been the acquisition of an Independent Chairman. Jan Hagen has demonstrated honest and open leadership, a willingness to learn and a level of common sense and integrity that has been most welcome, and that should serve England Basketball well




FINANCIAL CHARTS


Benefits include comprehensive insurance cover for players and clubs, a 10% discount from the England Basketball Shop, discounted hotel rooms and exclusive member competitions.

CLUB DEVELOPMENT

Eighteen months since its establishment, our partnership with the **Premier League 4 Sport** Programme continues to deliver increases in the number of young people taking up basketball.

CLUB DEVELOPMENT



England Basketball accredited clubs continue to play a pivotal role in growing and sustaining the sport locally.

This year has seen growth in both the number of accredited clubs and young people within those clubs. It has been positive to see so many clubs embracing our participation programmes *IM Basketball* and *Ball Again* to increase participation by offering activity to new groups of people.

The growth in participation amongst some of our larger clubs attests to the continued demand for the sport. Both Newcastle Eagles and Leicester Riders have recorded affiliated membership totals in excess of 1500, reflecting an ongoing commitment to develop basketball in the community. We have continued to support clubs to access funding to deliver local activity and projects. Basketball is now the second most successful sport in securing Sportivate funding and third for Sport England Small Grants funding, figures which evidence the significant need for funding at the participation end of the sport.

The development of high quality links with schools remains priority area for club development. Programmes such as *Premier League 4 Sport* have provided us with valuable insight as to how the number and effectiveness of school-club links can continue to improve.





Premier League 4 Sport - Satellite Club development

Eighteen months since its establishment, our partnership with the *Premier League 4 Sport* Programme, which involves creating partnerships between Premier League Football Clubs and our accredited hub clubs to develop a new satellite basketball club network, continues to deliver increases in the number of young people taking up basketball and making the transition from school to club.



PL4S - Facts and figures

- 10 football clubs working with Sport England England Basketball Clubmark accredited basketball clubs
- 36 new satellite clubs established (20 of which are new for this year)
- 1600 young people attended satellite clubs so far, with over 1200 new participants for this year. We have exceeded our yearly target by over 50%.
- Increase of 10% in girls basketball participation within satellite clubs
- 65% of young people retained in satellite clubs (attending 70% of club sessions throughout the year).
- · Increasing number of satellite club participants joining the hub basketball club

IM BASKETBALL AND BALL AGAIN

Over the past twelve months, England Basketball has utilised *IM Basketball* and *Ball Again* to provide more informal, weekly opportunities for those over the age of fifteen to play basketball. Integrated into the delivery of an increasing number of affiliated organisations, leisure operators and educational institutions, as well as being the key foci for our own development staff, we are pleased to be able to report that both programmes are flourishing.

IM Basketball

starts at 8,000.

England Basketball provided seed funding, to selected applicant organisations, to start and maintain *IM Basketball* throughout the academic year. Growing numbers of educational institutions (schools, colleges and universities) are reporting high levels of participation as a result. Created according to our understanding of the basketball market, *IM Basketball* is constantly reviewed and improved to ensure that it continues to attract young (14-25) participants within education. Estimated participation generated by the programme's first full year of delivery

Ball Again

Ball Again continues to appeal to adults (16+ and not in education) who wish to re-engage with the sport, as well as those trying basketball for the first time. Funded by England Basketball and delivered by a Ball Again PlayMaker with the emphasis firmly on fun and fitness, the programme continues to be successfully adopted by a broad range of groups and organisations. An estimated 1,700 participants took part in Ball Again sessions during the season.

SHEFFIELD 3 ON 3 TOUR

England Basketball Hosts Record-Breaking 3 on 3 Tournament at Meadowhall Shopping Centre

It was a weekend that started with some of the worst weather conditions imaginable but ended as one of England Basketball's most successful events.

New FIBA Europe records were set at the 3 on 3 Tournament held on the grounds of Meadowhall Shopping Centre's Car Park on 7-8 July in Sheffield. 197 teams took part in 371 games over two days, figures that eclipsed all other 3 on 3 events held by FIBA Europe during the summer of 2012.

This success followed months of planning and a set-up day in horrible weather. The event appeared to be in jeopardy the day before it started, as the set-up crew of England Basketball office staff and FIBA Europe representatives worked a 12-hour marathon in torrential rain that saw a near collapse of the River Don's banks. However, the weather began to improve late on Friday evening and by Saturday morning the sun was shining.

Apart from a short intermission on 7 July due to another downpour, a superb weekend of music, dancers, prize giveaways and 3 on 3 basketball saw an incredible event draw to a close on Sunday evening after capturing the imagination of hundreds of participants and a good number of passing Meadowhall shoppers.

Special thanks and appreciation goes to FIBA Europe for initiating, in 2011 their support for such events with the provision of portable courts, equipment and apparel. Extra thanks go to FIBA Europe's staff and drivers (who transported the courts and equipment in the huge trucks covered by the colourful logos of FIBA Europe). The event could never have been staged in Sheffield without the constant support, leadership and guidance of FIBA Europe's 3 on 3 manager,

England Basketball Chief Executive Keith Mair felt that it was the most entertaining, inclusive and enjoyable basketball event he had participated in during his time in the position.

He said:

"It was a wonderful experience and fantastic to see so many basketball people, with a wide range of backgrounds, ages and ethnicities, in one place and enjoying themselves throughout the two days. Our entire staff team, with the event planned and led outstandingly by Graham Blankley and Todd Cauthorn, performed well beyond what should ever be expected of them over three long days, especially throughout what was for many a 12-hour marathon setting up the courts in the horrible Friday weather. DYNAMIK NATIONAL SCHOOLS COMPETITIONS

Notes to the Financial Statements for the year ended 31 May 2013

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1.1 ACCOUNTING CONVENTION

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention as modified by the revaluation of certain tangible plant and machinery, and in accordance with applicable standards.

The company has taken advantage of the exemptions available in the Companies Act 2006 not to adopt the headings otherwise required by the act, as the special nature of the company's business requires such adaptation.

1.2 INCOME

Income represents amounts receivable for goods and services net of VAT and trade discounts.

Revenue grants are recognised in the period to which they relate except for specific project grants which are only recognised in the period received to the extent that related expenditure has been incurred.

1.3 TANGIBLE FIXED ASSETS AND DEPRECIATION

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows:

Computer equipment	33% straight line
Fixtures, fittings & equipment	20% straight line
Trophies	Not depreciated

The estimated useful life of trophies exceeds 50 years. No depreciation has been charged on the trophies as the directors consider that any charge and accumulated depreciation would not be material. In accordance with Financial Reporting Standard No.11 an impairment review is performed on the trophies if events or circumstances indicate that the carrying value may not be recoverable.

1.4 LEASING

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged against income on a straight line basis over the lease term.

1.5 PENSIONS

The pension costs charged in the financial statements represent the contributions payable by the company during the year.

1.6 DEFERRED TAXATION

Deferred taxation is provided in full in respect of taxation deferred by timing differences between the treatment of certain items for taxation and accounting purposes. A deferred tax asset is recognised where it is considered more likely than not that there will be sufficient taxable profits against which to offset brought forward tax losses.

1.7 GRANTS

Grants received in respect of capital expenditure are credited to deferred income and recognised in the profit and loss account over the useful economic life of the asset.

1.8 **VAT**

The Association is partially exempt and a special method for calculating re-claimable input VAT has been agreed with H M Revenue & Customs.

2 INCOME

The income of the company for the year has been derived from its principle activity wholly undertaken in the UK.
